CHURCH IN THE HILLS PC (USA)



There's a story in Judges chapter 7 about a battle when Gideon was judge in Israel. It has made a lasting impression on me and my journey of faith. The Israelites are about to attack the Midianites, but God tells Gideon they have too many soldiers. God says a victory would cause the soldiers to think they won the battle rather than giving God credit. Therefore, God gives Gideon a plan to whittle down the soldiers from over 22,000 to just 300. In other words, God puts the Israelites in an impossible position so that when victory comes, they will know that it was God's victory. This story and many others try to teach us the same lesson. God wants us to learn to trust him rather than trust our own strength and resources.

Church in the Hills has been declining in membership and financial giving for a couple of years, and the future appears uncertain. We've also experienced the retirement of Lisa as office manager, and this causes more anxiety about our future. Regardless of how things appear, God is still with us and the Holy Spirit is moving in important ways. Bible Study attendees and those attending the study of Native Americans have, without question, grown in faith. Our Worship seems more enthusiastic with people commenting regularly about feeling the energy. We have been blessed as a congregation and that blessing is the promise of God's presence with us. If God is with us, why do we worry about our future and a few difficulties? This is the very problem I've been preaching about for months. When trouble comes, people lose faith. We look at worldly and material things and we think God has somehow left us because we are no longer as blessed as we once were. Instead of thinking this is a crisis, we should embrace the opportunity to trust God. The story of Gideon teaches us that God wants us to live in faith rather than trusting our own strength.

It's no secret that I lack some administrative leadership skills. I'm not a worthy financial planner or business administrator but God clearly called me to be pastor of Church in the Hills, and the congregation confirmed God's call by their support. The Holy Spirit comforted me when I was anxious about becoming a solo pastor which would multiply the administrative responsibility. The Spirit's comfort came in the words, "Do it your way and don't try to be anyone else." Soon after I started, I was faced with our office manager's resignation. I prayed that God would provide a person with the gift of administration so that my shortcomings would not be a burden. Lisa Luxton was the answer I was hoping for. I can testify that God provides, and his provision comes through faith. I encourage you to pray and seek God's provision for us even if the situation looks impossible. In fact, the worse it looks, the more glory God will get when the victory comes.

JULY FINANCIAL CORNER

Church in the Hill's financial summary through July is shown below.

Total Income: \$164,764
Total Expenses: \$139,512
Net Income: **POSITIVE** \$25,252

July's net income was a positive \$27,637 but included a one-time contribution of \$30,287 from the Bellaire Youth Center project as a result of that project not going forward. Without that contribution, the net income would have been negative \$2,650.

We still have two projects looking for funding. We talked about the "Church Video Monitor Project" back in June with expected expenses of \$10,000. The newest project is one that has been discussed for some time and that is to stain the outside of the church and repair necessary trim work for \$13,500. That project is in final planning stages and hopefully will be completed yet this fall and is titled "Stain for the Saints". We are encouraging folks to donate to those two very worthwhile projects either through on-line giving or by check with project name on the memo line.

2 Corinthians 9:7 states "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."
