The word, “Advent” means “coming” or “arriving.” We are in the season of Advent because we are waiting for the arrival of Jesus into our broken world. We overlap the birth of Jesus with his second coming so that we learn to be expectant with our faith. If our faith is only focused on what happened two thousand years ago, we become stagnant. The Jewish people in Jesus’ day were expectant of the Messiah coming mostly because their lives were oppressed by Rome. Whenever people are oppressed, hope in a future savior helps them endure the present difficulties. Many great spiritual songs came from black slaves in America as they anticipated Jesus’ return to deliver them as Moses delivered the Israelites. We are certainly not oppressed which brings up the question, “What are we expecting this season of Advent?” “What are we waiting for?”

I know most of you remember waiting for almost everything when you were younger. You took pictures and had to wait for them to be developed. When you came home from school, you had to wait for supper to be prepared. If you went to the doctor, you had to wait days or weeks for test results. Every important milestone dangled in front of you, but you had to wait. You probably couldn’t date until a certain age. You couldn’t drive until you were 16. You couldn’t make decisions for yourself until you were 18. I don’t know how everything changed. It might be computers or the internet or cell phones but waiting seems like a thing of the past. We’ve lost the virtue of patience.

If everything we need is a click away and all comforts including the temperature of a room are controlled by our phone, what is left to wait for? I think this question has a simple answer. The things we complain about are the things we are waiting for. If we complain about war or immigration or elections, we are waiting for solutions. Complaining is a sign of discontent, but we might miss the opportunity discontent provides. We think complaining might bring a simple answer like ordering pizza on our phone. Complaining is the easiest response to discontent, but it accomplishes nothing. Prayer, on the other hand, channels our discontent and directs it to the creator and redeemer of the world. If we acknowledge our discontent before God, we feel the oppression of the darkness still rampant in our world. We become desperate for change like the poor and oppressed. We become hopeful of a better future, a future we can’t yet obtain. Waiting for Jesus’ return is not about preparing for an event. It’s about our willingness to be agents of his love in the world and paving the road for his kingdom to arrive “on earth as it is in heaven.” The Advent of his Kingdom is worth waiting for. It’s worth praying for. It’s worth living for and even dying for.
